Update on Women's Studies Activities

I want to use the column this month to give an update on Women's Studies activities. First, Sophia McClennen, Foreign Languages, is serving as interim assistant director and academic advisor on a quarter-time assignment during this semester. Spring semester is a busy time at Women's Studies, so we are very happy to have her assistance. For more on Professor McClennen, see page 3.

During the fall semester, the Women's Studies Curriculum Committee worked on the proposal for a graduate certificate in Women's Studies and solicited letters of support from a number of department chairs. The committee actually started the planning process last year as we discussed what a graduate certificate should be and how it might work with degree programs. We worked closely with the Graduate School because a certificate of the type we envisioned did not exist at Illinois State. As the Graduate School formulated certificate guidelines this fall, we submitted our proposal. We learned in early December that the certificate had been approved by both the College of Arts and Sciences and Graduate School Curriculum Committees and will appear in the 2002-2003 Graduate Catalog. Please see page 2 for more information on the certificate. This semester, the committee will work on a new graduate seminar on feminist theories and methods.

The Programming Committee spent a good deal of its time preparing for an eventful spring semester. Beginning Wednesday, February 6,

and running through April 10, we will host a weekly noon brown bag series, "Been There; Still Doing That: The Status of Women in Traditionally Female Fields." Speakers will explore how the field came to be female dominated and what that has meant in terms of the current issues and status of women in the field. The Women's Capabilities Initiative is a co-sponsor. A schedule appears in the newsletter. All of these programs are free and open to the public as are all Women's Studies programs.

The Seventh Annual Women's Studies Student Symposium will take place on Friday, March 29 in the University Galleries. In keeping with the university theme of "The Leading Edge: Issues in Technology and Society," we have invited Professor Dorothy Roberts of Northwestern University Law School to be the keynote speaker on the topic "Race and the Ethics of Reproductive Technologies." She is the author of *Killing the Black Body*, which received a 1998 Myers Center Award for the Study of Human Rights in North America.

Women's Studies is also collaborating with the School of Social Work in the Women's Capabilities Initiative (WCI), an academic, training, and community outreach program that addresses the situation, needs, and prospects of low-income women in Central Illinois—particularly minority women. The major WCI event this spring is the conference, "WOMEN: Unlimited Possibilities: Steps Beyond Survival," on Saturday, April 20 at the Baby Fold's One Normal Plaza location. The planning committee has invited an exciting line-up of speakers on four areas of emphasis: health, safety, housing and education. Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies Approved

The graduate certificate in Women's Studies has received approval at all curriculum levels and will appear in the 2002-2003 Graduate Catalog. So that interested faculty and students may know the requirements, we are providing an advanced look at the catalog copy:

Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies

The graduate certificate in Women's Studies is an option for students whose interest in women and gender issues leads them toward particular courses and thesis topics in their department/school and to seek further work in inter-disciplinary feminist theory and methods. This graduate certificate requires a 12-hour course of study. Students must complete WS 391 and WS 400 plus six hours selected from among the following courses: CJS 339, ENG 360, ENG 460, FCS 305, FCS 333, FCS 412, HIS 330, PSY 305, SOC 311, SOC 341, SOC 366. With the approval of the graduate certificate coordinator and the Graduate School, additional courses may be approved for the certificate. Non-degree seeking graduate students desiring to apply for the graduate certificate in Women's Studies are advised to contact the certificate coordinator. Degree seeking graduate students should consult their graduate program coordinator/advisor as well as the Women's Studies graduate certificate coordinator.

Admission Requirements

Students who seek the certificate in conjunction with a graduate degree program must meet admission requirements for that degree and also be admitted for the certificate. Non-degree graduate students must meet the university graduate admission requirements and be admitted for the certificate. Admission for all certificate students is made upon the recommendation of the Women's Studies certificate coordinator.

Faculty Profile: Sophia McClennen, Department of Foreign Languages

Professor Sophia McClennen joins the Women's Studies program at Illinois State University as the Interim Assistant Director and Academic Advisor. As a professor in the Department of Foreign Languages at Illinois State University, she currently teaches the undergraduate course English/Foreign Languages 206, Cultural Expressions in Social Contexts: Women of Asia, Latin America, and Africa, a Women's Studies elective.

McClennen received her AB from Harvard University in Philosophy and her MA and PhD at Duke University in Spanish and Latin American Literature. Her research interests include comparative cultural studies of Latin American film and media with a focus on gender. This has led her to explore the work of Mexican women film directors. She is currently finishing a book on the writer Ariel Dorfman and is also writing the entry for Cristina Peri Rossi in the *Encyclopedia of Erotic Literature*.

McClennen served on the Women's Studies Programming Committee from 1997-2000 and on the Curriculum Committee since 1998.

This semester she will draft a new course proposal for a graduate course on feminist theory and methods for the Curriculum Committee, assist with Women's Studies programming, and be available to advise Women's Studies minors. She will be at Women's Studies 11:00a.m. − 4:30p.m. on Tuesdays and 11:00a.m. − 12:00p.m. on Thursdays. ■
